Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1)

Hampshire Constabulary seek a review of the Premises Licence held by Corinne Whitlock (who is also the Designated Premises Supervisor) in relation to the premises known as "The George Inn" at Middle Wallop, this is due to an unacceptable level of crime and disorder and antisocial behaviour linked to the premises over a prolonged period, culminating in an incident of disorder in the early hours of 27/07/08.

Police have received complaints from local residents about noise relating to the premises and associated antisocial behaviour and disorder often late into the night and the early hours of the morning.

As a consequence Police have provided help and support to the D.P.S in the form of:

* A Licensee Support Pack containing guidance and advice on best practice for people employed in the licensing industry.

*Miss Whitlock was invited to join the local police led Pub Watch Scheme.

* Numerous supportive visits from uniform officers.

*One to One training by police Drugs Intelligence Officer for Miss Whitlock.

Despite the support and guidance of Hampshire Constabulary no improvement has been made, in fact a marked deterioration can be evidenced. Incidents have grown in severity and the potential for serious injury to adult customers and juveniles is real.

Following intelligence regarding underage sales police conducted a test purchase operation on 28/06/08 at the premises. Alcohol was sold to two 16 year old children by a member of staff employed by Miss Whitlock.

It is clearly evident that Whitlock has not engaged with police and has failed to defuse situations and has failed to be proactive in addressing the obligations of preventing crime and disorder and protecting children from harm. She has also failed to prevent public nuisance also an obligation under the legislation.

On 27/07/08 several incidents of disorder took place, police attended the premises at 03.52hrs following the report of a fight involving approximately 10 males. On arrival they were met by the DPS's partner Paul Elkin who stated he was the landlord. Although there was no fight happening on their arrival they could see that members of the public were in the bar drinking – Elkins claimed it was a "private party"

Police received two further calls around 05.45; one from a member of the public reporting 20 fighting at the pub and requesting an ambulance – a fracas could be heard in the background by the police operator. A second call was received from Whitlock a short time later – again shouting and screaming could be heard in the background.

On arrival police were greeted by what Miss Whitlock herself described as "World War Three" They found a 16 year old child drunk on the floor bleeding from the face.

The George Inn has a premises licence permitting the following licensable activities: Films,

Indoor sporting events,

Live music,

Recorded music,

Performances of dance,

Provision of facilities for making music, dancing or entertainment or a similar description, Late night refreshment,

Sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises.

The George Inn Public House is situated just off the main Salisbury to Andover Road and although it is in a rural location there are dwelling properties in the immediate vicinity and it is surrounded on all sides by dwellings.

The recorded Designated Premises Supervisor is Corinne Whitlock DOB 28/03/80.

Corrine Whitlock became the DPS for the premises in 2007 it was shortly after this that police were contacted by local residents complaining of loud music and disorder occurring both inside and outside the premises. Throughout July 2007 reports were received of regular disturbances caused by people leaving the pub.

In August 2007 there was a domestic dispute recorded within the premises involving the DPS and her partner Paul Elkins, having called 999 she would then not support any police action. Police were required to trace the premises number and on attendance Paul Elkins her partner refused all details to police.

In March 2008 reports were received about drug activity in the premises and police officers attended the premises to give advice and guidance on drugs activity. During this visit the plans for the premises were discussed and Whitlock stated that she felt she was being victimised because she was attempting to attract a younger clientele by providing music, parties, live bands and strippers. It suggested by police that this approach may attract negative attention.

On the 28th June 2006, officers from Hampshire Constabulary conducted a test purchase operation following receipt of intelligence that alcohol was being supplied to underage children at the pub. Two 16 year old children were able to purchase cider and a vodka based drink. At no time were the children asked for identification or challenged in any way. This operation was conducted in accordance with force policy and LACORS (Local Authorities Coordinators of Regulatory Services)

best practice guidance. Both children were clearly underage in both their appearance and demeanour.

On the 27th July 2008, a local resident reported that at 03:52 hours there was a fight outside the pub involving 10 males, police attended and found 15 - 20 people inside the pub, at this point PC Hughes recalls seeing one male lying on the sofa in the public area with a bucket beside him, he assumed that the male was being sick. A male who identified himself as the landlord, stated it was a private party and he had no idea about a fight. The police left but were called back to the area at 05:00 having received reports of a male in possession of a baseball bat. A 17yr old male who had been in the pub earlier in the evening was found in possession of a silver metal baseball bat and a black balaclava, he was dishevelled and in drink and was arrested. It was confirmed that the arrested male had made threats to a female in the pub earlier in the evening.

Police were again called to the pub at 05:55 the same morning following a report of a fight, this time accompanied by paramedics, when officers entered they saw smashed music equipment and broken glass all over the floor. There was a strong smell of alcohol and about 15 people were still inside who were heavily in drink. A 16 year old child was on the floor with blood coming from his nose, initially officers thought he was unconscious but he then became abusive and threatening, spitting at the officers. His father who was also heavily in drink and struggling to stand became abusive to officers and paramedics. One of the officers attending, PC Hughes says "I thought that there must have been trouble happening when we first arrived and had we been told then the second incident may not have happened".

This violent incident was so serious that seven police officers were required to attend these premises in this quiet rural location – this would have left large areas of the district with no police cover as a consequence.

The resulting police investigation evidences the fact that this final incident was the culmination of a nights heavy drinking and disorder at the premises that had occurred over many hours, a blatant disregard of the licensing obligations at the premises. The evidence clearly indicates that the male who identified himself as the landlord, Elkins had knowingly misled police during this incident. It is evident that the DPS Whitlock was present throughout the evening and had failed to fulfil her legal and moral obligations during this time.

Whitlock was required to provide a statement outlining the incident and amongst other things, in her statement she admits to the fact that an elderly female was served and drank so much brandy that she was eventually sick in the pub garden. She also says that she and her partner [earlier described by himself as the landlord] had a domestic argument in the pub; she describes her partner as being quite drunk at the time. She also admits to throwing a glass and kicking a stool in anger due to the behaviour of her partner, this occurred in the public area of the pub and in the full view of customers. Whitlock also states that during this time she was hit in the lower chest and stomach area, by another male customer, this is a serious concern as Whitlock is pregnant. As a result of the assault Whitlock was requited to seek medical advice in relation to her unborn child.

When spoken to by police the 16 year old child stated that on a scale on one to ten (with one being sober), his level of drunkeness was 8. He said he started drinking at The George at 19:00 and remained there drinking all evening. In police custody this 16 year old vomited all over himself and also over a police vehicle.

On this evening in July the D.P.S Whitlock, exerted no control over the premises or its customers and was also involved in disorderly conduct herself at the premises, this is indicative of the general running of the premises and confirms the fears of the local community.
