ITEM 4

Licensing Procedure Rules - Licensing Sub-Committee

Application

These Procedure Rules shall apply to all hearings of applications and other matters pursuant to the Licensing Act 2003 and subordinate legislation and any amendments thereto, and the Gambling Act 2005 and subordinate legislation and any amendments thereto.

Terms of Reference of the Licensing Sub-Committee:

1. Ward Members will have no involvement in the decision making process.

Procedure for hearing licensing applications:

1. The Council's Scheme of Public Participation will not apply.
2. At the start of the hearing the Chairman will explain the procedure to all those present.
3. The Hearing shall take place in public. The Sub-Committee may exclude the public from all or part of the hearing where it considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in public.
4. A party to whom notice has been given may attend the hearing and may be assisted or represented by a person whether or not that person is legally qualified.
5. The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the Sub-Committee.
6. Cross-examination will not be permitted unless the Sub-Committee considers it is required for it to consider the representations, application or notice as the case may require.
7. The Sub-Committee may impose a maximum period of time for each party to address the Sub-Committee.
8. To facilitate the discussion the following procedure will be followed in all cases except for reviews when 8(b) shall apply and interim steps hearings for expedited summary reviews when 8(c) shall apply:
 - (a) (i) The Licensing Manager of the Council or their representative will present the facts of the application and action taken, to the Sub-Committee.
 - (ii) The Applicant or their representative may address the Sub-Committee.

- (iii) Other parties may address the Sub-Committee in the following order:
 - Responsible authorities
 - Other parties
 - (b) (i) The Licensing Manager of the Council or their representative will present the facts of the review, and action taken, to the Sub-Committee.
 - (ii) The person requesting the review may address the Sub-Committee.
 - (iii) The licence holder may address the Sub-Committee.
 - (iv) Other parties may address the Sub-Committee in the following order:
 - Responsible authorities
 - Other parties
 - (c) (i) The Licensing Manager of the Council or his representative will present the facts giving rise to the review, and will outline any action taken, to the Sub-Committee.
 - (ii) The Police officer requesting the review or his representative may address the Sub-Committee.
 - (iii) The licence holder or their representative may address the Sub-Committee.
9. The Sub-Committee may permit the applicant or any party to question any other party.
10. The members of the Sub-Committee may ask any questions of the Licensing Manager or their representative, or of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.
11. Documentary or other evidence may be produced at the hearing with the consent of all the parties.
12. Where a party fails to attend or be represented and the Sub-Committee considers it necessary in the public interest it may adjourn the hearing to a specified date or hold the hearing in a party's absence.
13. The Sub-Committee may require any person attending the hearing who in their opinion is behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and refuse to permit that person to return or permit them to return only on such conditions as the Sub-Committee may specify. Any such person may submit to the Sub-Committee in writing before the end of the hearing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they not been required to leave.

14. The Sub-Committee may ask questions of its legal adviser.
15. The Sub-Committee will deliberate in private.
16. The Sub-Committee may request advice in private of its legal adviser regarding the drafting of reasons.
17. In the case of a hearing under the sections and circumstances set out in Regulation 26(1) of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (or any amending legislation), the Sub-Committee will make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

In any other case, the Sub-Committee will make its determination either at the conclusion of the hearing or within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.

18. A record of the hearing will be taken in a permanent and intelligible form.

ITEM 5 Application for the Review of a Premises Licence – Naz’s Cuisine, The Hundred, Romsey SO51 8BX

1 The Application

- 1.1 The application is by Hampshire Constabulary asking for the Review of the existing Premises Licence in respect of Naz’s Cuisine, 48 The Hundred, Romsey SO51 8BX. The application has asked for the Review on the basis that the Police consider the licensing objectives of prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance are currently being harmed by activity on the premises. A copy of the Review application is attached as Annex 1 to this report with supporting information from the Police contained in their Annexes A to F. The application for a Review requires the matter to be determined at a hearing. Unlike other Licensing Act applications there is no provision to cancel a hearing for a Review application, it must take place.

2 Background

- 2.1 Naz’s is a small Indian restaurant located in The Hundred in Romsey town centre in an area of mixed business and residential properties. The premises are licensed for recorded music, late night refreshment and sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises. A copy of the current Premises Licence is attached as Annex 2 to this report.

3 Grounds for the Review and the Licensing Objectives

The Police comment that they are particularly concerned about excessive levels of drunkenness and associated crime and disorder and public nuisance. In addition they are concerned over immigration offences. It is in these two areas that the Police consider the licensing objectives are being harmed such that there are grounds for the Review of the Premises Licence. The application for Review sets out details of the specific incidents of concern to the Police and additional information regarding these incidents is contained in their Annexes B to F. Annex A from the Police sets out suggested conditions which could be attached to the Premises Licence.

4 Relevant Representations – Responsible Authorities

- 4.1 **Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service** – Having examined the application the Fire Service does not wish to make any representation.
- 4.2 **TVBC Housing and Environmental Health Service** – The Environmental Protection Team comment that “whilst no complaints have been received directly by this team we were very concerned to see the reports provided by the Police. Romsey town centre is generally quiet at night and this premises is slightly removed from the main hub of the night time economy in the town. As such the noise generated by groups of people gathering, arguing and/or

fighting would stand out clearly in this location and there is obvious potential for town centre residents to be disturbed. Given that the premises is located a small distance from the bus station, train station and main car parks it is also foreseeable that people leaving the premises in a drunken state could walk through other areas of the town causing more widespread disturbance.”

5 Relevant Representations – Other Persons

- 5.1 There are no representations from other parties.

6 Policy Considerations

- 6.1 It is considered that the following extracts from the guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (April 2017 edition) are relevant.

- 6.2 It is considered that the following extracts from the Licensing Authority’s own Statement of Licensing Policy are relevant to this application:

Section A: Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The Statement of Licensing Policy has either previously been provided for Members of the Sub Committee or will be provided at the hearing. Copies can also be obtained from the Licensing Section of the Legal and Democratic Service or downloaded from the Council’s website.

7 Observations

- 7.1 The Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives of prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm. In making its decision, the Committee is also obliged to have regard to the national Guidance and the Council’s own Statement of Licensing Policy. The Committee must also have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence it hears. The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- a) Modify the conditions of the Premises Licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them

- b) Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the Licence
- c) Remove the Designated Premises Supervisor
- d) Suspend the Licence for a period not exceeding three months
- e) Revoke the Licence
- f) Reject the application and do nothing.

The Committee is asked to note that it may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be appropriate in order to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives:

- a) Prevention of crime and disorder
- b) Public safety
- c) Prevention of public nuisance
- d) Protection of children from harm

The Committee may decide that no action is necessary if it finds that the review does not require it to take any steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent the Committee issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that the licensing authority will regard such a warning as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the holder of the licence. However, where responsible authorities like the Police have already issued warnings requiring improvement – either orally or in writing – that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to concerns, the Committee should not merely repeat that approach.

Hampshire Constabulary are applying for a review of the premises licence on the grounds of:

- preventing crime and disorder
- the risk to public safety
- failing to prevent public nuisance

Hampshire Constabulary are requesting that serious consideration is given to revocation of the premises licence.

Naz's Indian Restaurant is a small restaurant in the town of Romsey which is situated along the Hundred. It is located in an area of mixed businesses and residential properties.

The premises licence holder is Naz's (UK) Limited.

A search on the UKGov website, Companies House lists the sole director (June 2017) as Ms Luthfun Nessa KHANOM.

The DPS is Mr Nazrul ISLAM.

The premises benefits from a premises licence allowing licensable activities as follows:

- The sale of alcohol - daily until midnight
- Late night refreshment – daily until midnight
- recorded music – daily until midnight

The current licence was issued in 2012, the previous licence having lapsed. The sale of alcohol is for consumption on the premises only. There are no conditions attached to the premises licence, other than mandatory conditions.

There are two areas where the Chief Officer of Police is concerned that the licensing objectives are not being promoted by the premises licence holder; Naz's (UK) Ltd.

These are:

- 1) Excessive levels of drunkenness and associated crime, disorder and public nuisance
- 2) Immigration offences

Following an event held in Romsey Town, The Beggars Fair, on 11th July 2015, there was serious disorder involving customers from the premises. For this particular annual event, the vast majority of the licensed premises in Romsey proactively close early at 2200hrs. Naz's Restaurant refuses to do so and as such, is one of the few premises selling alcohol past 2200hrs.

Annex B refers to the police investigation into crime reference 44150238183. Approximately 0020hrs on 12th July 2015, police started to receive 999 emergency calls reporting a large fight. The initial call was to a fight actually within Naz's Restaurant. Whilst police were en-route, a further eight 999 emergency calls were made to the police reporting up to 10 people fighting. One caller stated that at least one person had been knocked unconscious, and others had blood on their shirts.

From the accounts that were obtained when police attended, it was established that two separate groups of customers within the restaurant, both of which had attended after 22:00 had become involved in an argument.

The argument was left insufficiently challenged by staff and escalated into a fight between the males in the groups. This fighting spilled outside the premises, with at least four people disclosing that they had been assaulted.

One male had been knocked unconscious, and at some point had his head stamped on. One male had been head-butted, losing some teeth.

Another two males disclosed that they had been punched to the face, but received no injuries.

This incident was followed up with a meeting with the DPS Mr Islam. During this meeting. Police concerns included the levels of drunkenness of customers, the increased risk of crime and disorder when late night refreshment and alcohol is offered with no preventative steps in place, and improving the risk assessment of attracting customers to attend the premises after 2200hrs.

Mr Islam suggested that the premises did not sell alcohol to the parties involved. However, he had to be reminded that his responsibilities to promote the licensing objectives also relate to the provision of late night refreshment. He did not seem to grasp this.

The police requested that positive action be taken to prevent a reoccurrence of a similar violent incident. This included (but not exhaustive):

SIA staffing, a last entry time, earlier closing, the provision of alcohol with food only, CCTV and general due diligence training.

As this had been the first incident of such a serious nature, it was expected that Mr Islam and Naz's (UK) Ltd would take on board the advice provided without the need for formal enforcement action to be taken.

Mr Islam was spoken to again prior to the same event (Beggars Fair) in 2016. Mr Islam suggested that he had approached a SIA company for staffing. Unfortunately this seems to have only remained as a suggestion!

Changes to the operation of the restaurant did not occur, with dynamic policing having to be provided on the day of the event to prevent any crime and disorder.

Further meetings have been held in preparation for the 2017 event. Yet again Mr Islam has failed to communicate what steps will be in place to support the licensing objectives.

It seems that neither Mr Islam, nor Naz's (UK) Ltd can take on board their obligation to reflect on incidents which occur at the premises, and make the necessary improvements. The Chief Officer of Police is therefore requesting that enforceable formal conditions are added to the premises licence to mitigate and prevent crime and disorder when events of a similar nature are held in the area.

During 2017, there has been an alarming rise in incidents connected to the premises. These include: assaults, anti-social behaviour, fraud and criminal damage. Most concerning are the most recent assaults which have involved customers assaulting staff. Attending police officers have reported drunkenness as being a major contributory factor.

A meeting was held with Mr Islam on 25th April 2017 to discuss the changes relating to immigration and the Licensing Act and to ensure that communication regarding events is maintained with the responsible authorities.

A request was made for Mrs Khanom, as premises licence holder, to be present. Regrettably, she failed to attend the meeting.

At the meeting, a number of measures were discussed by the police, yet again, to improve and support the licensing objectives. It seems that none of the recommendations made by police previously have been put in place, despite assurances. As such, it is no surprise that assaults on staff and crime at the restaurant, which could have been prevented, have in continued.

Recommendations included the installation of CCTV, implementation of due diligence training and recording of incidents and any refusals made, as outlined in Annex C.

The revised Guidance issued under S182 Licensing Act 2003 (April 2017), outlines that CCTV installed inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally (paragraph 2.3). The use of CCTV as a crime prevention tool is supported by Test Valley Borough Council Licensing Authority in the Statement of Licensing Policy (Policy A1).

Due diligence training is essential in providing staff who are involved in the sale of alcohol. It offers information on offences under Licensing Act 2003. These include the sale of alcohol to children and the sale of alcohol to drunk people. Effective training empowers staff to be able to make refusals, therefore preventing crime and promoting safety of staff and customers.

Annex details the police incident records relating to the venue. The following incidents demonstrate the concerns Hampshire Constabulary and lack of promotion of the licensing objections.

44170072273, at 2208hrs on 24th Feb 2017, it was reported to police that a staff member has assaulted Mr Islam. This incident remains supported by Mr Islam, and is currently

awaiting trial. A 17yr old staff member witnessed the incident. However, had CCTV been installed at the premises, the investigation may have been resolved more quickly for Mr Islam and his staff.

44170159194 00:39 29th April 2017 – Local officers report anti-social behaviour (ASB) outside premises, which is directly linked to customers from Naz's Restaurant. Drugs search conducted on one person involved. PC Bates provides further information in her statement.

44170205167 Intelligence received that youths who are heavily intoxicated are congregating outside of the premises, some looking too young to be drinking alcohol

44170185922. At 2209hrs on 17th May 2017, police officers report that there is a large group outside Naz's Restaurant causing a disturbance

44170199378. At 22:45 hrs on 26th May 2017, police are requested to attend the venue and resolve a dispute between staff and a customer.

44170202986 et al - At 20:47hrs on 29th May 2017 - Common assault injuries to 2 members of staff and 2 customers. Damage is caused to crockery and glasses. This remains a live investigation.

At 20:47hrs on 29th May 2017, following a 999 call to police, officers were deployed to the restaurant. On police arrival, it was established that a group of 4 customers, described as being 'drunk' have become loud and were swearing. It took another customer and not staff within the venue to challenge this group's language and behaviour, one member of the rowdy group in particular became aggressive and abusive and assaulted the other customer by grabbing him around the throat. Mr Islam and another staff member have finally intervened, both being assaulted. Mr Islam is grabbed by the throat and the staff member has had her fingers bent backwards.

Whilst this was ongoing, another customer has begun to film the incident on their mobile phone to which the suspect has taken objection to this and has thrown items of cutlery at her, fortunately, none caused any serious injury.

The attending officer raised concerns over the level of intoxication, questioning that the suspect was already drunk when she has come into to the restaurant. She continued to be served alcohol to the point that the suspect is described as 'unable to stand up because she was "so drunk' (Annex E)

Thankfully, the levels of injuries sustained by staff and customers were minor. However this incident causes significant concern, especially when steps to prevent such an incident had only been discussed with Mr Islam a matter of weeks prior.

Drunk customers have been allowed entry to the venue unchallenged and have been served alcohol. Both of which are criminal offences under the Licensing act 2003.

The failure to prevent these offences has ultimately led to the nuisance to other customers to the extent that customers, not staff, have felt the need to challenge disorderly behaviour.

This incident alone shows the complete disregard to the licensing objectives from both the premises licence holder and DPS. It also highlights that the advice and support from Hampshire Constabulary to prevent such incidents has been totally ignored.

44170221270 - 11th June 2017 fraud (obtaining by deception)

Police are currently investigating an allegation from a customer that debit card details have been obtained from the restaurant and used without permission by staff.

44170230087 16th June 2017 - Criminal damage.

Damage has been caused to the front window of the premises by a person who has been walking past. Mr Islam is supporting police action, but due to the lack of CCTV evidence at the restaurant, this hindered and delayed the investigation. The offence is being denied and the lack of co-operating evidence drastically undermines the case

Immigration offences

Despite specific legislation preventing a business from employing staff who do not have the right to work in the UK, Naz's Restaurant has come to the attention of both police and Immigration officers for employing people without the correct documentation.

Annex F summarises immigration investigations known to Hampshire Constabulary.

44150131978 April 2015 – Over stayer arrested by police on execution of a S8 PACE warrant, as detailed by PC Dennett.

44150188709 June 2015 – Over stayer arrested by Immigration

44170131586 April 2017 – Over stayer arrested by Immigration

44170137904 (Intel) April 2017 – 2nd over stayer found at premises dealt with by Immigration. Officers report a 'challenging visit' due to the behaviour of the DPS and his son.

44170192800 (E41 Intel) May 2017 – workforce is being trafficked

Hampshire Constabulary work closely with Immigration Enforcement officers in preventing illegal working. Illegal working is at the centre of a wealth of other crimes. At worst, illegal working can be indicative of modern day slavery or human trafficking whereby vulnerable people are often exploited to work in unlawful conditions.

In a Government release on the subject, dated 6th April 2017, Immigration Minister Robert Goodwill says:

"Illegal working cheats the taxpayer, has a negative impact on the wages of lawful workers and allows rogue employers to undercut legitimate businesses.

"These new measures will allow us to work more effectively with licensing authorities and the police to prevent illegal working in a high risk sector and take the action needed against businesses flouting immigration laws."

The article goes on to say:

'Today's licensed premises provisions form part of a wider package of measures in the Immigration Act 2016 to tackle illegal working, which is a key driver of illegal migration to the

UK, and often leads to exploitation. They follow similar changes to the licensing regime for private hire vehicles and taxis which were introduced in December.
About 60% of all civil penalties for illegal working served in the UK in the year to February 2017 were issued in the retail, hotel, restaurant and leisure industry sectors, many of which hold licenses.'

The revised Guidance issued under S182 Licensing Act 2003 (April 2017) outlines certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously (para 11.27).

One such crime is:

- For employing a person who is disqualified from that work by reason of their immigration status in the UK.

Paragraph 11.28 goes on to say that 'where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence – even in the first instance – should be seriously considered'.

It is extremely disappointing to learn that, despite the offences relating to the employment of illegal immigrants in 2015, further offences are still being investigated in 2017. Naz's (UK) Ltd has repeatedly failed in their obligation under to Licensing Act 2003 to prevent crime at Naz's Restaurant.

With respect to the prevention of Immigration offences, the Chief Officer of Police would request that the Licensing Authority look to add relevant conditions, as outlined in Paragraphs 2.6 & 10.10 of the revised Guidance.

Hampshire Constabulary has given serious consideration to the options open to the Licensing Authority, and is of the opinion that revocation of the premises licence due to the lack of commitment to the licensing objectives by the premises licence holder.

However, should the committee be minded not to revoke the premises licence, the Chief Officer of Police is of the opinion that the premises may potentially be assisted in promoting the licensing objectives with the following steps:

- Addition of conditions being placed on the premises licence, as outlined in annex A.
- Removal of the DPS
- A period of suspension of 28 days is also requested in order to allow time for required changes to be achieved and prevent a reoccurrence of the crime and disorder incidents which have brought about the review application.

Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

- 1 Section 19 - Mandatory Conditions: Where licence authorises supply of alcohol
- (1) Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
- (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

2 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 -

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where -

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4.-(1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Condition)

Sections 19A and 73A of the Licensing Act 2003 (as inserted by section 32 of and Schedule 4 to the Policing and Crime Act 2009) provide for the Secretary of State to prescribe by order up to nine mandatory conditions applicable to relevant premises licences and club premises certificates.

Relevant premises licences and relevant club premises certificates are those authorising the sale and supply of alcohol to the public in licensed premises or to members or guests of clubs in club premises. The Schedule to the Order sets out a mandatory condition which applies to relevant premises licences and club premises certificates.

Paragraph 1 provides that the condition requires a relevant person to ensure that no alcohol is supplied from the premises to which the licence or certificate relates at a price below the permitted price.

Paragraph 2 contains relevant definitions for the purposes of paragraph 1. The permitted price is defined as the aggregate of the duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol on the date of its sale or supply and the amount of that duty multiplied by a percentage which represents the rate of VAT chargeable in relation to the alcohol on the date of its sale or supply. A relevant person is defined as a premises licence holder, designated premises supervisor or personal licence holder (in relation to

premises in respect of which there is a premises licence) and a member or officer of a club who is present and able to prevent a supply of alcohol (in relation to premises in respect of which there is a club premises certificate).

Paragraph 3 provides that the permitted price is rounded up to the nearest penny.

Paragraph 4 provides that a change to the permitted price which would apply as a result of a change to the rate of duty or VAT charged in relation to alcohol would not apply until the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the day on which the change in the rate of duty or VAT takes effect.

3 SCHEDULE - Mandatory Licensing Conditions

1. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or .

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise); .

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective; .

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective; .

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner; .

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability). .

2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either

(a) a holographic mark, or .

(b) an ultraviolet feature. .

4. The responsible person must ensure that

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures.

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint; .

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and .

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; .

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and .

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold,

the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Licensing conditions (proposed)

1) CCTV

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit. The system will be able to cope with strobe lighting (where used) and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format. Footage supplied in a digital format will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Western Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.

2) Incident book

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry

will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.

If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.

At the close of business on each day the incident book will be checked by the manager on duty where any entries will be reviewed and signed. If incidents have occurred the duty manager will de-brief door staff at the close of business. Should there be no incidents then this will also be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

This record will be retained for 12 months.

3) Refusals book

A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager/manageress.

The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.

The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.

4) Challenge 25

There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.

Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing a holographic mark or the "PASS" logo, and the person's date of birth.

If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

5) Training-

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.

All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

Naz's Restaurant – proposed conditions cont.

Romsey Town events

When the event entitled 'Beggar's Fair' operates in Romsey, the following shall apply:

- 1) Where licensable activities are conducted past 22:00hrs, SIA registered staff will be employed at the premises from 20:00hrs until close of business and all customers have dispersed from the immediate area.
- 2) Where SIA registered door staff are employed, they shall be employed solely in a safety and security role.
- 3) Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise to persons taking table meals and for consumption by such a person as an ancillary to their meal.
- 4) A written risk assessment will be conducted confirming what steps will be in place for the event. This risk assessment will be provided to Hampshire Police Licensing Team and Licensing Authority no later than 28 days before the event.

A written risk assessment will be conducted for all other events within the immediate vicinity as to the implementation of the above points.

For the avoidance of doubt, a table meal is defined under S159 Licensing Act 2003 as a meal eaten by a person seated at a table, or at a counter or other structure which serves the purpose of a table and is not used for the service of refreshments for consumption by persons not seated at a table or structure serving the purpose of a table.

SIA staffing

At any time where SIA registered door staff are employed, they shall be employed solely in a safety and security role and employed for the duration of the event.

The licence holder shall maintain a duty register giving details of each and every person employed in the role of a security/door person and shall provide upon request by any Police Officer or Council Officer, the following details:-

- (a) The licence number, name, date of birth and telephone number of that person;
- (b) The time at which he/she commenced that period of duty, with a signed acknowledgement by that person;
- (c) The time at which he/she finished the period of duty, with a signed acknowledgement by that person;
- (d) Any times during the period of duty when he/she was not on duty;
- (e) If that person is not an employee of the licence holder, the name of the person by whom that person is employed or through whom the services of that person were engaged;
- (f) The register shall be so kept that it can be readily inspected by an authorised officer of the Council or Police Officer;
- (g) The licence holder shall ensure that this register is kept in a secure environment in order to prevent unauthorised access or alterations to same.

Prevention of illegal working

The premises licence holder will conduct right to work checks on all persons employed, whether paid or unpaid, at the licensed premises.

A copy of any document checked as part of a right to work check will be retained at the premises for a minimum of 2 years.

These documents will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary, Home Office Immigration Enforcement Officers, Test Valley Licensing Authority or any other responsible authority upon request.

Documents that demonstrate an entitlement to work are set out by The Immigration (Restrictions on Employment) Order 2007 and the Immigration (Restrictions on Employment) (Codes of Practice and Amendment) Order 2014.

Summary of incident:

Numerous calls are received regarding a fight in NAZ CUISINE (Indian Restaurant) on THE HUNDRED, ROMSEY.

The circumstances appear to be that a group of males and females have been eating in NAZ's CUISINE when a fight between two women has begun. The males who have been in company with the females have become involved and a fight has erupted between them inside the restaurant.

On arrival Police locate VICTIM lying in a small alleyway between ALDI and a row of houses on the opposite side of the road to NAZ CUISINE. VICTIM is conscious but apparently unable to stand in the first instance. He slowly comes round and refuses to engage with Police. When ambulance arrives, it takes the best part of ½ an hour to convince him to be seen by ambulance. Ambulance manage to have a quick look at him and did not believe that he had any breaks to his face/jaw but they did want to take him to hospital due to concerns about him possibly being unconscious. VICTIM refused to be taken to hospital and was physically resistant. Ambulance staff did not believe the hospital treatment was urgent and so VICTIM was allowed to go on his way.

VICTIM 1

One male, believed to be SUSPECT, has head-butted VICTIM . The fight has then spilt out into the road – witness Naz ISLAM. ISLAM does not know either male but has provided a description of both. The aggrieved matches.

VICTIM states that he has been punched and kicked to the head, causing his teeth to be knocked out. He had visible facial injuries and was seen by ambulance. He states that he does not know who the offenders are but it is believed that he is friends with and and does in fact know .

VICTIM 2

VICTIM has been punched to the ground and has at some point been unconscious. He has also had his head stamped on - WITNESS is the main witness to this assault and is also the only person who can name both offenders. He has stated that he wants to provide a statement however left the scene with VICTIM after VICTIM left the ambulance.

Witnesses:

WITNESS 1 – Stated that she saw the aftermath and VICTIM lying on the floor.
WITNESS 2 – Was assaulted when he tried to break up the fight. He states that he has no idea who the others were that were involved and does not want to make a complaint.

Nazrul ISLAM – Owns and works in NAZ CUISINE and witnessed VICTIM get head-butted by a male in a blue cheque shirt before the fight spills out into the street.

WITNESS 3 - Was assaulted when he tried to break up the fight. He states that he has no idea who the others were that was involved and does not want to make a complaint.

Evidence:

No one present wanted to provide statements or were able to identify the suspects. WITNESS stated that he would provide a statement and then left the scene with VICTIM and was dismissive of Police so it is unknown whether he will engage with Police in the morning.

The scene has been captured on BWV as well as most of the visible injuries to the aggrieveds.

Consideration was given to setting up a scene but due to the aggrieveds being uncooperative and the scene being fully recorded on BWV it was decided that a scene was not put on.

Additional concerns:

VICTIM made several remarks and hand gestures suggesting that he was going to kill SUSPECT, specifically that he would shoot SUSPECT as a result of the injuries he has sustained.

Enquiries need to be made into the level/grading of this threat and an RMS will be created to reflect the comments.

Arrest attempt at at approximately 0240 hrs.

Meeting 15/07/15

People present – Mr Nazrul Islam(DPS), PC 22237 Conway

This meeting was held following a fight between customers which continued in the street. This incident occurred following the Beggars Fair event on 11th July 2015.

You explained that two separate groups had come to the restaurant after the event. An argument started between the two groups. You tried to calm the situation by moving one of the groups, but the arguing continued. A customer intervened to assist you, but was assaulted by being head butted. The two groups were told to leave, but continued fighting outside.

You explained that neither of the arguing groups were served any alcohol, only food.

As you are one of the few premises open late on Beggar's Fair events, then the risk that the restaurant would attract customers who are highly likely to be drunk does need to be considered. Extra steps need to be taken in order to promote the licensing objectives and minimise the risk of violence and disorder.

Such steps would be:

- The employment of SIA registered staff for events such as Beggars Fair.
- Utilising a last entry time
- Consideration of an earlier closure time.

For Beggars Fair 2016, myself and the local policing team will expect improvements to be in place, such as SIA registered staff.

The premises has also come to police attention during 2015 for other investigations, including potential immigration offences and allegations that the premises is being used in relation to drug dealing.

Please be reminded that, as the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor, you are responsible for preventing crime and disorder at the premises. The sale and distribution of drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and knowingly employing a person who is unlawfully in the UK or who cannot lawfully be employed are offences which are treated particularly seriously by police. Should evidence come to light that Naz's Restaurant is involved in serious crime, then enforcement action will be taken. Enforcement action can be considered include a review of the premises licence or prosecution.

Conditions check and general licensing advice

CCTV

Premises: You do not currently have CCTV in place.

Police: It is strongly advised that CCTV is considered. It is an effective tool in preventing crime and disorder, as well as being able to provide independent evidence.

For your information, below is sample wording for a condition which is often applied to premises licences in relation to the standard of CCTV operation anticipated by police.

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit. The system will be able to cope with strobe lighting (where used) and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format on either disc or VHS. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Western Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.


Training

Premises: You do not have a formal training package in place. You hold regular meetings with staff to remind them of their responsibilities.

Police: Police do recommend that a formal due diligence training package is implemented, with formal refresher training conducted every six months. Training can go towards a premises licence holder and DPS being able to evidence that they are committed to promoting the licensing objectives.

For your information, below is a sample wording which is often attached as a condition:

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.

All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

Age verification policy

Premises: Staff are fully aware of their responsibilities to ask for ID from young people

Police: Having an effective age verification policy is a good way of preventing sales of alcohol to children under 18. Police recommend using a Challenge 25 policy. For you information, below is sample wording of the Challenge 25 policy which is often added to premises licences as a condition. I have included posters with this letter.

There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.

Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the person's date of birth.

If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.


'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

Refusals book / Incidents book

Premises: You do not currently operate an incident recording system.

Police: A written record of refusals will help you as the DPS identify staff that are not confident in making challenges to verify the age of a customer, or refuse sales to drunk people, so you can provide further training to prevent offences occurring.

Police recommend that incidents are also recorded, as this can provide an early indication of where improvements can be made.

For your information and guidance, below is sample wording which is often attached to premises licences as conditions.

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.

If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.

At the close of business on each day the incident book will be checked by the manager on duty where any entries will be reviewed and signed. If incidents have occurred the duty manager will de-brief door staff at the close of business. Should there be no incidents then this will also be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager/manageress.

The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.

The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months


Beggars Fair

I am writing to you as Naz's Restaurant remains a concern for police during and after the Beggars Fair event.

Following the serious incident after the 2015, which involved customers from Naz's Restaurant, the police licensing team discussed steps to be put in place to support the licensing objectives and prevent further crime and disorder. It was disappointing to learn that advice from Hampshire Constabulary was not taken on board for the 2016. I understand that Naz's Restaurant did close early, but only following intervention from the Inspector.

Beggars Fair will be held on Saturday 8th July 2017. As you are one of the latest premises opening in Romsey on this day, concern remains that crime and disorder will focus on Naz's Restaurant. In preparation for this year's event, I would like you, as premises licence holder, to conduct a written risk assessment. The steps I would like you to seriously consider in your risk assessment include, but are not limited to:

- Provision of SIA staffing
- Preventing late night entry of drunk and disorderly customers to the premises, for example closing at 2200hrs in line with the voluntary closure of other licensed premises in Romsey. Depending on your risk assessment and staffing, police may consider other options.
- A commitment that Naz's Restaurant will only operate as a restaurant during Beggars Fair, for example a commitment that alcohol will only be sold to people who are taking a table meal at the premises. This should be made clear to customers prior to seating, and through other advertising means (posters, conversations at the door etc).

Nazrul ISLAM (DPS) attended Romsey police Station as requested. PLH Luthfun Nessa KHANOM (mother) not able to attend.

DPS was advised that police have been made aware by Immigration of the recent visit to the premises. DPS was told that this meeting was separate to any investigation by Immigration or enforcement action to be taken by Immigration. However, police are seeking to gain a commitment from him and the PLH, by way of conditions being added to the premises licence to promote the licensing objectives and prevent further offences being committed.

DPS was advised that Immigration Officers have a power of entry, and that staff and himself should remain professional when dealing with enforcement officers. DPS took this on board, but stated that it was busy at the time, and he didn't want the customers to get angry due to the delay in food.

Proposed conditions were discussed:

CCTV - not only would CCTV be able to support investigations where DPS and staff are subject to crime, but would also provide independent evidence to support other investigations (ie Immigration). DPS agreed that installation of CCTV would be beneficial

Incidents / Refusals record - recording incidents would support DPS / PLH by providing a record of good work. Records should be kept of all incidents, including those which the DPS feels does not warrant police attendance.

Challenge 25 - DPS stated that this was in place and advertised

Due diligence training - DPS stated that training is in place, however it is a family business. Staff involved in the sale of alcohol were generally his brother, son and daughter.

Prevention of Illegal working - it was explained to the DPS that recent changes to Licensing Act Guidance allowed for the provision of conditions to be added to the premises licence relating to keeping a copy of the right to work document at the premises, in addition to responsibilities under other Immigration legislation. Police and Immigration would be looking for a condition on the premises licence to show commitment towards preventing people without right to work gaining employment at the premises.

Beggars Fair - proposed conditions discussed. DPS was advised that the local NPT team were disappointed that verbal commitments made were not carried out, and that concerns had been raised on the night with the DPS, leading to early closure. DPS was advised that conditions were now requested so that commitments are upheld.

Log entry:

Regarding Beggars Fair, DPS stated that he is in contact with Marcel Cullers from Security Nation, and is expecting confirmation today (25/04/17) regarding SIA staff. DPS has requested SIA from 2000hrs until midnight. DPS did show a text conversation, however there was a spelling error (Marcel spelt Marsel), so i have suspicions about the legitimacy of the text messages.

DPS was asked to provide confirmation in writing as to the proposed operating on Beggars Fair by beginning of June 2017.

DPS confirmed that he will be only selling alcohol with food in future on Beggars Fair, and not prior to the food order being placed.

DPS was advised that police are looking for the above points to be added as conditions on the premises licence to confirm commitment to the licensing objectives. The offences / penalties for non-compliance with conditions was also explained. DPS was advised to discuss the conditions with his mother (PLH) and seek independent advice if required.

As police are requesting the installation of CCTV, DPS was asked to confirm intentions by end May 2017 as to whether conditions on the premises licence would be added voluntarily. DPS was advised that police are keeping all options open, including a review of the premises licence.

Contact details, Copy of the proposed conditions, minor variation application form and Guidance to documents to demonstrate entitlement to work (P145-147 S182 Guidance) were provided.

I spoke to one lad who was particularly aggressive in his tone; When asked if the group had all been in Naz's he replied "What if we have, it's not against the law is it?" I noticed he was holding a nearly full large bottle of lager. I don't know how that lad is but he left the area very quickly.

I spoke to the female FSP of the BMW who stated the car belonged to her partner. Stood by the car was a lad I now thibk was ██████████, he stated he had missed out on the night at Naz's as he was working.

The group eventually completely dispersed other than ██████████; I spent some time talking to him and he stated they all went to Naz's as "one of our mates works there" - he woudln't tell me who that was.

I did think it was strange for him to live in so far away and to work in Romsey, I conducted a PNC check on the male and he was of no trace.
