Colour contrasting hand rails.

5. Are there any comments you wish to add regarding your preferred option or any other comments you wish to make?

Removing the restriction would not provide a better service.

Currently there is no unmet demand.

The only fair way to go is with a proper survey to prove that no unmet demand exists.

This consultation does not address the question of unmet demand.

Not enough work in the current economic climate.

London style taxi preferred to provide better facilities and contrast against prebooked variety.

Andover has a significant number of wheelchair users who are currently being disadvantaged.

TVBC should monitor the population level in and around Romsey and if there is any significant increase consideration should be given to issuing additional licences.

[We] believe that the provision of a sufficient number of licensed hackney carriages and wheelchair accessible hackney carriages should be based on market research and matched with supply and demand.

There should be some encouragement for wheelchair user/ambulant disabled taxis. Perhaps a grant or interest free loan.

The Parish Council would like to see more facilities for the disabled.

I would support an option that avoids the cost of a full survey, meets customer needs, enables competitive services, meets government requirements and keeps the existing licensed trade happy in precisely that sequence.

Given the pressure on Council resources we should release all controls and this is emphasised by the small number of taxis.

I believe we should give everybody an equal opportunity to hold a hackney carriage licence and the market will automatically control the numbers with no need for any interference.

I believe the existing system works well.

I have seen people waiting for taxis at both the railway station and on the town's taxi ranks in the evening so there must be a shortage.

We do need more hackney plates but only a restricted number.

Most disabled people find access to wheelchair converted vehicles more difficult than to ordinary saloon cars; only full time wheelchair users need an accessible taxi.

Complete and unrestricted licensing of hackney carriages in a small town such as Andover I am sure you will agree is not an option.

As Andover town is forever growing the number of hackney plates should be increased over a period of time.

If continuing with restriction should increase limit to 100 [vehicles] with if possible some sort of way to ensure an even spread within the Test Valley area.
